My Experience with OCA's Speak & Lead with Pride Program

This spring, I participated in OCA San Mateo's six week Speak and Lead with Pride program. On the first

day of this program on February 20, 2010, I walked into class with a goal of improving my public speaking skills. What I didn't expect, was how many other doors would be opened to me as a result of taking this class. Speak and Lead gave me the opportunity to participate in OCA's National Convention. This program also gave me the motivation and confidence to apply for an intern position at Congresswoman Jackie Speier's district office.

That first day, the Speak and Lead teachers asked us what we wanted to accomplish in the six-week program. There were a variety of responses that included "overcoming shyness", "improving communication", and "developing leadership skills."

Each week, the class focused on a specific aspect in public speaking. A topic was assigned for students to prepare a three-minute speech that would allow them to exercise the newly learned skills. Students delivered their speeches and received valuable critiques from teachers and peers. I especially appreciated these workshops as they gave me two perspectives of public speaking: one as the speaker and another as part of the audience. OCA teachers challenged us with speech topics that included "Find and choose a prominent Asian American role model and explain why he or she has inspired you," and "Talk about an Asian Pacific Islander stereotype and tell why people should know about it". The intriguing speech topics made me take a closer look at the Asian American community, my own identity, as well as the issues that Asian Americans face today.

At the end of the program, a competition was held to allow students to put what they have learned to test. The topic for our speech was very general, which gave us the freedom to select a subject that

we were passionate about. We had to state a pressing issue in America and suggest ways we could solve it. On the night of the competition I spoke about the faltering public education system in America. I was impressed by the speeches delivered by my fellow Speak and Lead students; we had all accomplished our goal of improving our public speaking skills. Everyone was a winner that night. School board members, OCA members, Assemblyman Jerry Hill and representatives from Senator Leland Yee and Congresswoman Jackie Speier's office were among the many prominent community leaders that were in the audience.

In June, I was invited to attend the OCA National Convention where I was asked to present my speech. Over the course of four days, I met inspirational Asian American guest speakers which included students from South Philadelphia High School who had organized a protest against racial violence. There were seminars, book readings, convention booths, luncheons, and an event each night that allowed us to explore the Asian community in Houston. At the Youth Recognition Luncheon, I delivered my speech in front of an audience of around 500. When I stepped in front of the podium, the nerves and jitters I felt before all disappeared, and I put everything I had learned from Speak and Lead into use.

A month after the convention, I started a summer internship at Congresswoman Jackie Speier's district office. This experience was eye opening, challenging, and a valuable learning opportunity. At first, I felt overwhelmed by the huge amount of procedures that interns had to follow. However by the end of the first week, I was enjoying my job of answering constituent phone calls, recording opinions, scanning documents, uploading cases, and making files and certificates. Besides

learning practical office skills, I also became more knowledgeable of bills and proposals that our government is working on. The things I have learned from Speak and Lead have been extremely relevant to my job at Congresswoman Speier's office.

When I enrolled in OCA San Mateo's Speak and Lead, I never expected the generous fountain of opportunities that OCA would expose me to. I am thankful for OCA's admirable goal of educating the next generation of Asian American leaders. Inspired by my experience with OCA, I have made it my own initiative to embrace my identity as an Asian American, work hard, and start giving back to the community that has given me so much. I encourage fellow high school students to get involved with OCA, and Asian American community.

She graduated from Harvard and wrote many children's books such as *Almond Cookies*, *Dragon Well Tea*, *Amelia to Zora* and *A Is for Asia*, which was named one of the Best 100 American Children's Books of the Century by Ruminator Review.



World and was accompanied by a special Chinese language presentation of the book.

The duo, "Plink and Plunk", made up of retired school teacher, George Louzensky and writer, Charlie Chin, played banjos and accordion, offered a selection of sing-along-songs and folk song in their presentation. They brought a lot of fun to the audience of all ages.

Margo King Lenson, author and editor of *Pacific Voices: Talk Story v1-4*, presented stories through oral histories.

Hiroshi Kashiwagi is a Nisei poet, playwright, author, actor and librarian. His book, *Swimming in the American: a Memoir and Selected Writings*, was awarded the American Book Award 2005 by the Before Columbus Foundation. He performed his play *The Betrayed* with Sue Asano and read a short

poetry reading of his internment camp experience.

Rick Rocamora was a documentary photographer and author of *American's Second-Class Veterans*. He used historical anecdotes and a chronology to talk about his experience of being a photographer during

Filipino WWII for 18 years. He also showed a lot of pictures he took and explained his point about American veterans' struggle for recognition and equity in the United States.

Eddie Fung was in conversation with Margo King Lenson, publisher and editor of *Pacific Voices* about his engaging

experiences. His talked about his books *Chinatown Kid*, *Texas Cowboy* and *Prisoner of War* and his engaging experience: he grew up in Chinatown and joined the Army only to become the sole Chinese American soldier. After he was captured by the Japanese during the World War II, he managed to survive through working as a slave laborer on the infamous Burma Railroad. Eddie's wife, Judy Yung was also one of the speakers in this event.

Judy Yung specializes in oral history, women's history and Chinese American and Asian American history. She talked about her books including *Poetry and History of Chinese Immigrants on Angel Island, 1910-1940* and *Unbound Feet: A Social History of Chinese Women in San Francisco*. Her upcoming book is titled *Angel Island: Immigrant Gateway to America*.

Children present were able to play by hitting the pinata to end the get together.


The attendees enjoyed themselves. Among our OCA supporters were, Rod Hsiao, Trustee San Mateo




Chris Wong - Technology
