### JACL/OCA Summit

Attending the JACL/OCA Summit in Washington DC was an incredible experience for the both of us. We learned a great deal about OCA's national level work and new advocacy techniques; met many

inspiring intergenerational leaders and advocates across the country; and rediscovered the rich and powerful history of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in the United States.



This joint experience with JACL participants supplemented this and gave us a unique look into the work and goals of another Asian American organization as well.

Our favorite part of the summit was Lobby Day, where summit attendees split into groups and headed to Capitol Hill. One of our groups visited 7 congressional offices including our own Congresswoman Jackie Speier - to advocate for open immigration policies. Two other groups lobbied other issues surrounding such topics as education and the census. These efforts aside, a focal point



of the summit was to bring home helpful skills to expand local advocacy initiatives. The impressive syllabus of extensive training and practice certainly achieved this. From the many panels, we saw the

incredible solidarity and dedication that exists between JACL, OCA, and other major non-AAPI civil rights organizations.

During the summit, we also met many others: we sat with a panel including Holly Holm, the Executive Director of White House Initiative on Asian American and Pacific Islanders also known as WHIAAPI. We had a difficult

but necessary conversation with the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Department of Homeland Security, moderated by David Inoue, the Executive

> Director of JACL. And we heard from leaders of many other key advocacy groups such as the Anti-Defamation League, NAACP, and P-Flag.

Post-summit, we're more reenergized and prepared than ever to continue working alongside our newly expanded JACL/OCA family.
